



How does the controlled hunt draw work?

Most tags (75 percent) are awarded based on preference points. Every year you don't draw your firstchoice tag on deer, elk, pronghorn and spring bear hunts, you get a preference point, which increases your odds the following year. The remaining 25 percent of tags are awarded randomly amongst all remaining first-choice applicants, so you always have a chance to draw your first-choice hunt. Controlled hunts are divided into hunt series based on species, and then further divided into hunt numbers based on location. Hunters can apply once in each hunt series each year. Hunt series:

- 100 Buck deer
- 200 Elk
- 400 Antelope
- 500 Bighorn Sheep (no preference points awarded for sheep hunts)
- 600 Antlerless deer
- 700 Spring Black Bear
- 900 Rocky Mountain Goat (no preference points awarded for goat hunts)



Controlled hunts

Controlled hunt tags are limited and are available only through a drawing or lottery. They must be applied for in advance through the control hunt process and are usually required for hunts in eastern Oregon. The deadline to apply for controlled hunt tags is May 15 each year, except for spring bear hunts where the application deadline is Feb. 10.

What to Do About A House Payment You Can't Afford.Senior Citizens and Mortgage Options

Not long ago, a senior, Frank, called me about his home. He explained, "I have been making my mortgage payments from my IRA. My social security is not enough to maintain the mortgage payment and leave me enough to live." He explained that he had minimal equity. The extra retirement would not last forever. He was worried and didn't know what to do.

I am the Executive Director of HELPS, a nationwide nonprofit law firm that educates seniors how they can maintain their financial independence. Many seniors have house payments they can't afford. They have less income because of retirement or job loss. Perhaps a spouse passed away or other income was lost. Senior homeowners have options.

Many learn their home is too big or too much work to handle themselves. If they have equity, they can simply sell the home. A realtor can obtain a market analysis. If a sale would provide sufficient money after a realtors commission (usually 6%), then selling the home and obtaining less expensive housing might be a good option. Seniors that have significant equity could investigate a reverse mortgage. A reverse mortgage pays off the existing mortgage. The senior then can live in the home without a house payment until they pass away. If there is enough equity, it is possible to have access to additional monies either in a monthly payment or line of credit. Seniors that qualify for a reverse mortgage can keep a home that otherwise they could never afford. You must be at least 62 and have a minimum of 55% equity in the home. For example, if the home is worth \$100,000, then you can owe no more then \$45,000. Upon your death heirs will have around a year to sell the home. The reverse is paid and they get the balance. Heirs are not responsible if the home doesn't sell for a sufficient sum to pay the reverse.

What if there is little or no equity in the home? A senior can always stop making a house payment they can't afford. That is what Frank decided. He realized that once his nest egg was gone, there would be nothing to show for it. He realized the house was simply too big. He wanted to preserve his retirement for his future needs.

When payments are not made, a house will eventually be foreclosed. Foreclosure is a legal process a lender must go through, to get the home back. It is generally a slow process. At HELPS we ahave seen seniors live in their homes without making a payment typically for a year and a half to three years before they move. A persons does not need to move when they stop payments. Mortgage lenders prefer persons to occupy the home while it is going through foreclosure. This gives time to save for a future move.

Will money be owed when the home is foreclosed? The short answer is, almost never. Some states allow for a judgment for excess money owed after aforeclosure sale, called a deficiency. This is rarely pursued by mortgage lenders. Furthermore, seniors social security and retirement income is protected by federal law- it can't be taken from seniors.

If seniors don't want to stay in the home they can contact a Realtor and attempt a "short sale," which would avoid a foreclosure. That is when a mortgage lender agrees to accept a lesser sum when the home is sold. A lender can also be contacted about accepting a "deed in lieu of foreclosure," where staying in the home is not a prioirty.

If there are two mortgages, and the senior can afford the first mortgage, stop paying the second mortgage might be a good option, A second mortgage will very seldom foreclosure if payments are stopped. The debt is still owed, but where remaining in the home is important, this can be one solution.

Loan modification is where the home buyer ends up with a lower payment they can afford. The Federal Home Affordable Modification Program, HAMP ended December 31,2016. Lenders often have their own private programs. Home loan modification is not guaranteed, nevertheless many homeowners are successful in modifying their mortgage obtaining a payment they can afford. Paperwork and patience is necessary when going through any loan modification.

Mortgage assistance programs are offered by some states. Google mortgage assistance programs and your state, to determine if there are programs where you live. Finally, keeping a home you can't afford, should not be the end-all. Seniors have options. Even if in the end ,the home goes back, seniors I speak with, are almost always relieved to be free of the pressure of a payment they couldn't afford.

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LAKE COUNTY SHERIFF REPORT

January 18th, Deputies responded to the 1300 block of Center Street regarding a welfare check of an elderly man. When the individual was contacted he seemed confused and out of sorts. During the contact it was determined that an outstanding warrant out of Lake County was confirmed. The elderly man was cited and released to appear into court. The incident has been referred to adult DHS. January 19th, while on routine patrol Deputies contacted a known female who had an outstanding warrant inside the laundromat. Contact was made and the warrant was confirmed. The female was transported to the Lake County Correction's Facility and booked.

January 19th, Deputies responded to a burglary in progress in the 1000 block of South F Street. The resident had called 911 because his neighbor had entered his residence uninvited and began making threats. The suspect told the victim he had 30 minutes to get out or the suspect would start throwing punches. The suspect left the house and returned to his own residence. The suspect was contacted and interviewed. The suspect stated he had gone over to the victim's residence to tell him to get out of town. The suspect said he just walked right in, because that's what he always does. The suspect said he went over to the victim's residence to take care of some business and that the victim did not belong here. The suspect was arrested and transported to the Lake County Correction's Facility and booked for Criminal Trespass First Degree. The case has been forwarded to the DA's Office for review and charging.

January 20th, Deputies responded to the 500 block of North J Street regarding a misuse of 911. The investigation revealed that the resident had called 911 multiple times due to hallucinations from the use of methamphetamine. The resident, who is a frequent flyer, was arrested for PCS-Meth, Misuse of 911 and Probation Violation. The subject was transported to the Lake County Correction's Facility and booked. The case has been forwarded to the DA's Office for review and charging.

BACK IN THYME

EXOTIC PLANTS:

Benzoin Tree: Styrax Benzoin Dryand Storax family - Styracaceae

On His voyage in 1497 -1498 around the Cape of Good Hope to India, the Portuguese navigator Vasco da Gama was presented with a gift of benzoin, a substance highly valued by the Indians. Because of the vanilla like aroma, they chose benzoin for an incense in their temples. Medicinally, they used it to relieve shingles, ringworm, and a number of other skin disorders. In other parts of Southern Asia, benzoin was used to mend sores on the feet and was traditionally applied to heat the wound made by circumcision.

A member of the storax family, S. benzoin, like many of its relatives is a fast growing tree and ranges in height from about 15 feet to an imposing 115 feet. It's fragrant clusters of silky white blossoms are followed by round, 2 inch fruits that hold one or two round seed. The bark of the tree, covered with a silky whitish brown, contains the valuable aromatic resin.

Commercial growers in warm, tropical areas of the Far East fin that benzoin trees are fairly easily cultivated. In some regions, seedlings are put in before a crop of upland rice so that the advancing grain can shade the young tress. When a tree reaches six or seven years old, workers slash it with a hatchet or cut deep triangular Holes in the bark with a knife, and the resin - a yellowish white to reddish brown fluid begins to flow and to harden into rears, or lumps. The flow is greatest during the first three years of tapping, and can continue for another three. A tree usually dies before it reaches the of 17 years.

Benzoin is very bitter, hence seldom administered internally. Since it has expectorant properties, helping to loosen phlegm in the mucous membranes of the respiratory passages, it has been prescribed for acute obstructive laryngitis (croup). It is inhaled by vapors from a small amount of boiled water with a teaspoon of a benzoin tincture in it. Benzoin is also an antiseptic and astringent to heal small cuts. The resin is used in skin protective products to aid healing of chapped or blistered skin. It is used as a fixative in soaps, perfumes and creams. Small amounts are added to beverages and baked good as flavoring.
