Obituary

Services for Edith Pitcher. long time north Lake County resident, were held in early December at Reed Lake, near Prince George, British Columbia.

The daughter of Mark and Kate Ferns, Edith Clara Ferns, was born December 13, 1913 at Phoenix, Or. She died of heart failure Friday evening, Dec. 5 at her home.

Mrs. Pitcher was an infant when her family from Phoenix to Shaniko by train, then on the Fleetwood, east of Fort Rock. Later they made their home in Silver Lake where Edith attended school and graduated from High School. She was a Daly Fund college student at Ashland at the time of her mariage in Bend to Leonard Pitcher of Silver Lake on January 2, 1930.

After doing commercial fishing at Craig, Alaska the Pitchers moved to the Fort Rock farming community and, after several years, on to Prince George where they farmed and logged. Her husband prededed her in death in July, 1967.

Survivors are sons Owen and Jerry Pitcher and a daughter, Fern Brown, all of the Prince George area. There are seven grandchildren and several great-grandchildren. Mrs. Pitcher is also survived by two brothers: Victor of Prineville and Darrell, LaPine, as well as a sister, Carmen Dawson of Lostine, Or.

Mrs. Pitcher attended the Sept. 1986 homesteaders reunion at Fort Rock with her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Pitcher.

Soil Conservation

The annual meeting of the Fort-Rock Silver Lake Conservation District is set for January 15, between 10 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. at the Fort Rock Grange Hall. Lunch will be catered by the North Lake County Cow-Belles and hosted by the district.

The program will center on "Complete Animal Management", a program developed by Keith Cromwell and Hugh Barrett from the State Soil Conservation Service staff, according to Carol Chugg, chairperson for planning.

In their presentation economist Cromwell and Barrett, range conservationist, plan a round table discussion to include ranchers attending, with an opportunity to bring up their specific problems and discuss possible solutions.

Another guest will be Don Hansen, OSU state veterinarian. His discussion will focus on diseases, vaccination methods and methods of treatment.

Bill Zollinger, extension beef specialist from OSU will present ways to manage the herd, including cost-cutting tips, and selecting replacements. Invitations have also been extended to Jack Kanalz, state conservationist and Dale Boner of Bend, area conservationist, as well as state commission members, Senator Eugene Timms, Bob Elder of Paisley, and county commissioner Jim Ogle.

This is a meeting for the ranchers in the area and all are invited and urged to attend and discuss how costs can be cut.

Robert E. Tuttle, local district chairman, will preside at the session and directors will give a progress report and outline plans for the next year. Mike Mackey, district conservationist, will assist.



From Mental Health

The holiday season is supposed to be a time of great joy and happiness. It can also be a time of great stress and strain as well as depression. This is often due to a variety of factors including overindulgence (eating, drinking and spending), sometimes an inability to spend, or too high of expectations about what the holiday season will bring. Fortunately you can do something about the "holiday blues."

Starting with Thanksgiving and then through the New Year we start overeating and then feel bad about the extra pounds. There are several things that can be done to deal with these problems. These include not buying as much food for parties or dinners; buy enough not too much. Give away doggie bags to guests, especially give those foods that would really tempt you. If you know a family who might appreciate leftovers in the form of a stew or hash. Freeze the leftovers immediately before you have a chance to eat them. Don't leave out dishes of "goodies." Don't make cookies. Do say no to second helpings. Do take a walk. Do continue your exercise program.





Christmas Tour

The Christmas Valley Christmas Tour was conducted Sunday, December 14. The group met at the Community Hall at 2 pm and went first to the Community Church.

In the church they found a large tree, about 10' high, cut by church members, the John Effinghams and Tim Warkentins, and decorated by His Kids (5th - 8th graders). There were satin balls, icicles, tinsel and decorations made several years ago by those attending church. Holly branches and two red candles were on the piano, while Paulette Warkentin's white poinsettia, three red candles, and tree branches were on the altar table. Bouquets of fresh flowers on the back table and entrance table included snapdragons, stocks, chrysanthemums, petunias, nastursiums, geraniums and carnations from the Dale Overholser's solar greeenhouse.

Viewpoint Ranch east & south of town was next visited. There in the cheery cookhouse dining room Luke Ramsey, one of the cowboys, had decorated a lovely pine tree about 7' tall. It was covered with wooden toy ornaments, lights, and tinsel. It was topped with a yellow flowered wreath with an angel. Shelves about the room were decorated with angel hair or juniper branches with little Christmassy figures nestles in them. Kathy Carlon is the cook there and many of the decorations are hers.

At Connie and Terry Nofziger's home on Millican road we were greeted with green branches and red bows around the porch. Inside there were large decorated socks hanging behind the wood stove. There were three potted poinsettia plants and a fresh tree decorated with balls, dough art, stuffed tuys, tandy tames and lights. It was topped with a white, lace trimmed stuffed doll angel. Of special interest was the fact that each year Connie buys a tree decoration for each of their children and when they are grown they are free to take them with them when they leave home. There were many litle center of interest areas about the living and dining areas. One was the two goblets, one green and one red, that she bought the first year she & Terry were married. A ceramic creche was on a buffet with holly and a candle. Santa's sleigh set in snow was on the hutch. Angel hair surrounded some knitted

snowmen. There were three singing gnomes, green salt & pepper shakers with red balls and ribbons, straw bells with red ribbons, and a grapevine wreath with pine cones, green branches and ribbons. Connie says that when she was a child Christmas was not celebrated much in her home so she always tries to make Christmas really special now.

The Christmas Valley Market and Hardware decorations included cotton snow on the door, folded paper snowflakes hanging from the ceiling, with glittery gold stars. Tinsel was draped around the room & red crepe paper was wound around the posts which were topped with bows.

At the Christmas Valley Lodge Christmas lights decorated the entrance. Christmas bells hung on the door. Inside, the large fireplace had big socks and latch hooked Santa and Mrs. Santa pictures hanging on the chimney. Each table was covered with a dark red leatherette cloth centered with a white vase with red & white silk flowers. There was a row of potted poinsettia plants on a shelf and wreaths on the wall, one was made of rope and had red & white flowers. A bushel sized basket of pine cones sat on a stool covered with a small red and green patchwork quilt. The divider featured a row of appliqued felt socks, each different. Counters held more hand made items, a crocheted Mr. and Mrs. Santa in a skating scene and a crocheted sleigh, horse, and bridge scene, all intricately made. On the piano were crocheted candles with a pine cone centerpiece. The windows were framed with tinsel and bells. The decorating and much of the handwork were done by Peggy Shumway.

At the Assembly of God church we heard stereo Christmas music coming from behind an outdoor manger scene. Joseph, Mary, three wise men, five angels, and three sheep were all built of plywood, artistically designed, two-dimensional and almost life sized. They surrounded the manger, which was the center of attraction. It was lighted by Christmas tree lights around it and a spotlight from the ground in front. All these lights come on automatically at dusk. The figures were designed, built, and painted by Rev. Jim Kraemer, assisted by his wife, Waneta. The two north windows were decorated with a creche in one and an artificial tree in the other. The tree held lights, balls and candy canes. The windows had tinsel around the inside and there was a swag of green boughs and bells on a wall.

Over the entrance of Valley Center Foods were Christmas tree lights and a string of bells that blinked and chimed Christmas music. An artist was at work on the front windows when the tour came by. It was Steve Ferebee, a cowboy from Viewpoint Ranch, using paints from another local artist, Vivian Peek. There were two scenes, both had backgrounds of sage and rabbit brush which we are so used to around here. In one there was a cowboy on a horse facing Santa (in the next scene) and holding up a large Christmas package with one hand. The other scene was of Santa in his package filled sleigh, flying through the air, pulled by reindeer. Inside the building and over the door was an almost lifesized cardboard Santa and two large Christmas gifts all on a flat red background. There was tinsel swinging between the posts and around the posts of the store and red folded paper bells hung from the ceiling. The clerks wore long red elf caps trimmed with white. There were snow men and Santa and a basket on the scales and the poinsettias that were for sale added to the decor.


Christmas Valley Lakeside Terrace Restaurant greeted us with a sign over the front door saying 'Merry Christmas', along with tinsel and a swag of green boughs and a bow. 








MAZE 1 The Kickoff
