HUNTING & FISHING REPORT

ANA RESERVOIR: hatchery rainbow trout

Ana Reservoir remains ice-free during the winter because of springs producing constant 60°F water. Trout and hybrids remain active during the winter months. The water level is currently 13 feet below full pool and is expected to remain so until spring. Anglers should be prepared for dirt/mud conditions during this time. Fish can be caught using bait, lures, and flies from shore or boats.

ANA RIVER:

hatchery rainbow trout

Rainbow trout are active throughout the year in the river and anglers have been catching fish with bait, flies or lures.

DUNCAN RESERVOIR: rainbow trout

The ice at Duncan Reservoir was unsafe when checked on Jan 7. ODFW does not recommend ice fishing at Duncan Reservoir currently. Anglers wishing to ice fish can access Thompson Reservoir, which has safe ice. Anglers wishing to ice fish can access the reservoir by snow mobile. Anglers should use caution during first-ice conditions including: using the "buddy system," wearing a PFD in case of thin ice, carrying a throwrope, and using a heavy metal staff to check for thin-ice. Vexilar's Ice Fishing Today website has a quick 2-minute video describing how to be safe during early ice

THOMPSON RESERVOIR: rainbow trout, largemouth bass

Access to the reservoir is not blocked by snow. Anglers wishing to ice fish can access the reservoir by 4-wheel drive vehicles to either boat ramp. The ice was checked on Jan. 7 and is about 12-inches near the dam. Fishing was slow during that time. Anglers should use caution during first-ice conditions including: using the "buddy system," wearing a PFD in case of thin ice, carrying a throw-rope, and using a heavy metal staff to check for thin-ice. Vexilar's Ice

Fishing Today website has a quick 2-minute video describing how to be safe during early ice.

LAKE COUNTY

Within the county Waterfowl season have different closure dates. Duck season closes on 19 January and Goose season closes on 26 January. Cold temperature during the latter part of December has caused ice to form on most of the major water bodies in the district. Almost all of the migratory waterfowl have moved south.

Cougar hunting is open. Populations are healthy due to good habitat and prey base. If hunters can find a fresh cougar kill, calling within a ½ mile of that kill can be very effective. Mule deer herds are well above traditional winter areas due to a lack of snow and periods of extreme cold temperatures at lower elevations. Cougar hunters should focus on areas with deer concentrations and so far this winter those areas are between 5,800 and 6,800 feet.

Coyote numbers appear to be increasing throughout the county. Prey distress calls still appear to be effective, however the breeding season is fast approaching and effectiveness of coyote vocalizations will increase through March. Upland Bird - California Quail and Chukar seasons run through the end of January. The California Quail hatch was good but the birds are most common on private land and hunters must get permission. Hunters are finding very few Chukar throughout the county

SUMMER LAKE WILDLIFE AREA

This section was updated on January 13, 2014
Parking permits are now required on all vehicles. Hunters get the permit free with the purchase of their annual hunting

license.

Hunting success was generally slow for waterfowl during the past week. Weather conditions were favorable during most of the week as a storm system past through the area. Ambitious hunters willing to hike to distant bird use areas and spending most of the day in the field enjoyed good success. Casual hunters jump shooting or attempting to pass shoot close to access areas and roads saw very poor hunting success. Weather conditions are generally mild. Daytime high temperatures were in the 40-50s while night time lows were in the high 20's or low 30's nearly all week. Skies were generally cloudy, winds were moderate breezy most of the week turning strong over most of the weekend. Frozen conditions deteriorated over much the area, and waterfowl were not as concentrated as they were during the previous week.

For the 14th week of the season, hunter participation (56 check-in) was down -27.3% from the same week of the season last year, and down -59.2% from last week. Reported harvest (96.4% check-out) of 76 birds (73 ducks, 2 geese and 1 Am. coot) was down -49.7% and -66.3% from the same week in 2012 and last week, respectively.

Duck hunters reported the harvest of 41 mallards, 17 gadwall, 6 bufflehead, 6 American wigeon, and 3 other ducks of 2 species. The duck per hunter average of 1.55 was down -11.5% and 20.7% from last week and the same week of the season last year, respectively. Hunters reported taking only 2 geese (Canadas). This harvest was down -95.1% from the same week of the season in 2012 when 41 were reported taken, and down -71.5% from last week's 7 birds.

As yet I don't even know the alphabet. If you're looking for more formal training, your computer is the portal for all kinds of opportunities. Kahn Academy (www. kahnacademy.org) offers classes in math, art, computer programming, economics, physics,

chemistry, biology, medicine, finance, history, and more. The academy is always free. Major colleges now offer between them at least 800 free online classes. You can check them out at http://www.openculture.com/free. These classes include everything from humanities and social sciences (archeology, art, art history), classics and the classical world (ancient history and philosophy), economics and statistics, film, food, geography, history, languages, law, linguistics, literature, music and performing arts, philosophy, sociology, biology, math, science—you name it.

If computers baffle you from the get-go, take advantage of free tutorials and classes at http://www.gcflearnfree.org/ computers. For more advanced training, check out http://www. intelligentedu.com/cat1.html. In the guest for learning, never overlook people with skills you don't have, but would like. For instance, you might have a friend who quilts and/or sews. 

Ring-necked pheasant is closed now and no California quail harvest was reported last week. The prospect for the upcoming week remains only fair for waterfowl hunting. DUCK, COOT AND SNIPE SEASON WILL CLOSE ON SUNDAY, JANUARY 19TH. GOOSE SEASON WILL REMAIN OPEN THROUGH THE 26TH. Frozen over conditions have declined over the past week. Low numbers of waterfowl and a mild weather pattern will result in difficult hunting conditions. Weather conditions for the upcoming week are forecasted to remain mild for the entire week. High temperatures are forecasted to be in the low to mid-

casted to be in the low to mid-50s and nighttime lows will be in the high 20s to low 30's. Under these conditions, a majority of the wildlife area's wetlands will continue to open and birds will spread out to recently thawed areas.

Pass shooting from dikes will continue to be very poor. Hunters utilizing decoys and willing to spend most of the day in the marsh should have fair success.

Those hunting interior areas around open pockets of water, away from dikes last week reported doing well, while dike shooters saw very poor success. Jump shooting along Ana River was reported to be only poor, constant pressure has moved birds away from most sections of the river.

The weekly waterfowl count conducted on Tuesday January 7th found about 2,500 ducks and 800 geese present.

The next count is scheduled for January 15th and results will be posted on the wildlife area's telephone answering machine the following day.



SUMMER LAKE WILDLIFE AREA (cont.)

Habitat conditions are improving with all units beginning to thaw. Wetlands across the area remain around 60% frozen at present.

Summer Lake proper remains fairly low but is increasing in size slowly.

THE HUNTING SEASONS FOR SCAUP AND RING-NECKED PHEASANTS CLOSED FOR THE REMAINDER OF THE HUNTING SEASON ON DEC. 31ST!

Hunters need to remember all of Bullgate Refuge has been returned to refuge status where no hunting or entry is allowed (except to retrieve lawfully downed birds).

In addition, the entire Bullgate Refuge is dry in preparation for major wetland enhancement work. As a consequence, about 300-400 acres in the hunt area along Bullgate Dike in the southeast portion of Between The Dikes unit and the northeast corner of Summer Lake proper will be dry.

All hunters must have a free daily hunting permit in their possession and are required to check out at the end of the day. Self-serve permits are available in the Checking Station Lobby at Headquarters. Please read and follow instructions when obtaining permits.

Check-out boxes are found at each campground, Headquarters and major access areas. Please check the 2013-2014 Oregon Game Bird Regulations for daily bag and possession limits.

Federally approved non-toxic shot is required for all game bird hunting.

BACK IN THYME HERBALS

Lu's second choice of curiosity is our numerous growth of sagebrush. Sagebrush is of the sunflower family. (Artemisia Tridentata NUTT). Also called Basin Sagebrush, Common Sagebrush, Big Sagebrush, Wormwood- Compositae.

The term sagebrush refers collectively to several species of low shrubs distribut-


ed throughout the semiarid regions of North America. Among these species, tall sagebrush (Artemisia Tridentata), the state flower of Nevada, has the broadest ecological tolerance and can survive under the greatest range of environmental conditions. It grows best in deep, relatively moist soils that are mildly basic (rather than acidic). They may become very large and

robust, up to eight feet tall and equally broad through the branched crown. It is designed to increase the efficiency of water absorption and retention under semi-arid conditions.

Sagebrush produces two types of leaves, lobed ones that persist throughout the year and non-lobed, smaller and softer ones that appear along the branch tips in early winter and drop during drought the following summer. The plant becomes somewhat dormant during the drier part of the year, thus conserving its water. It has a two component root system: small, widely dispersed, shallow roots which absorb water quickly following a rain,

and coarse, penetrating roots that draw water from reservoirs deep underground.

Sagebrush has minute flowers of numerous yellowish heads during late summer or early fall. Sagebrush is wind pollinated which in summer breezes causes an allergic response in some people, further extended by the extended flowering period. The volatile chemicals making the strong sage odor also has a mild al-



lergenic effect.

Another sagebrush species of western steppeland (Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana) is stiff sagebrush (Artemisia Rigida) a major dominant in dry rocky areas.

The genus was named after Artemisia, wife of Mausolus, ancient ruler of Caria (Southwest Asia Minor). Mausolus died in 353 B.C. His bereaved wife erected a magnificent mausoleum in his memory, which became one of the seven wonders of the world. Artemisia herself was named in honor of the Greek Goddess Artemis, the virgin huntress or goddess of wild nature.

The American explorer,

John C. Fremont, noted the appearance of big sagebrush during his westward journey through what is now Wyoming in 1842, calling it by the name of its European relative Absinthe. The settlers who followed soon came to regard its presence as a good omen, since where it grew in abundance, the soil was fertile enough to support farming.

From prehistoric times. the western indians made

use of the treelike shrub, belonging to the same medicinally important genus plants as European Tarragon, Absinthe, and Mugwort. They chewed the leaves of sagebrush to ease stomach gas and used a tea made from the leaves to treat other stomach disorders, as well as colds and sore eyes. When settlers arrived, they took up some of

the native uses of the plant and added their own. Sagebrush preparations are used to treat headaches, diarrhea, sore throat, vomiting and even bullet wounds. Indians in the Southwest ground the seeds for flour, and many more set great store by a kind of hair tonic, made fragrant with sagebrush. Pioneers often used the fast growing shrub as firewood.

Sagebrush contains a volatile oil that can be added as an aromatic to liquors and hair rinses or used as a bug repellent.

I have found no cautions on sagebrush.




