KCC celebrates graduates in-person; record number of high school achievements

KLAMATH FALLS — Klamath Community College awarded diplomas on Friday, June 10, to a crowd of graduates, who were supported by their families on the KCC lawn offering hearty congratulations. After two years of hybrid livestreaming and limited in-person ceremonies due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Friday's commencement ceremony served as both a celebration of the graduates, and the ability to overcome the added burdens of higher education pursuits amidst unexpectedly lengthy health restrictions. Graduation activities were also livestreamed online for students and families unable to attend in-person. Following a presentation of colors by the Oregon Air National Guard, a rendition of the national anthem by Alyssa DeFillipo, and an invocation by pastor Jim Boyd, KCC President Dr. Roberto Gutierrez welcomed the large crowd to KCC.

"It has been awhile, not having face-to-face, this is so good to see all of you," said Gutierrez. "For many of you, your college experience has resulted in something much more than a degree, it is a chance for a new beginning – a pathway to approach opportunity and change."

Diplomas were distributed by program, with each program lead taking a turn at the microphone to announce graduates' names. Included among the hundreds of graduates were 10 high school students achieving the impressive feat of receiving their associate

degree and high school diploma simultaneously, along with an additional 19 high school students who received pathway certificates – most for KCC's Digital Media Design program.

The featured keynote speaker was David Cauble, CEO of Sky Lakes Medical Center. He reflected on the accomplishment of students completing their degrees despite the added difficulties imposed by COVID-19, and on his personal memories of his graduation 28 years prior, while also offering advice.

"We experience the greatest growth when we are willing to explore the unknown, and stretch ourselves in new ways," advised Cauble. "And when we inevitably fail, and we will fail, we have the opportunity to learn and grow."

KCC Vice President of Student Affairs Gail Schull highlighted the personal stories of two graduates: Tricia Gardner and Paul Monteith. Gardner was identified for not only graduating with honors, but doing so alongside her daughter who also collected her associate degree. Monteith, who works as a teacher's assistant with the KCC Welding program, and also operates a 501c3 aimed at rehabilitation and peer support with careers for individuals in recovery from drug abuse or recent incarceration, was noted for his community efforts and expansion of his Tayas Yawks nonprofit. He will participate later this month at the statewide Invent OR inno-

vation and entrepreneurial competition in Grants Pass, representing KCC among approximately 40 other collegiate teams.

KCC Director of Retention and Student Success Oscar Herrera was also honored as this year's "KCC Employee Who Made a Difference in the Lives of Students" – a recognition determined by anonymous student vote. Several personal stories were shared about how Herrera had gone above and beyond to help students accomplish their goals.

In total 210 students received diplomas and pathway certificates in the festivities, after which time graduates and families were invited to a reception complete with gifts, food, and a photo booth for photos to commemorate the occasion.

KCC will host an additional graduation ceremony for its Klamath Center for Education & Training (KCET) students at 6 p.m. Tuesday, June 21.

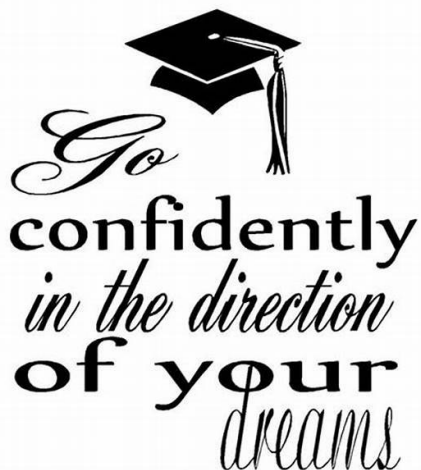

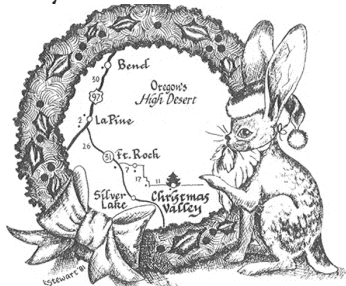

PUBLIC NOTICE

- Restrictions on physical alterations: You may want to make an improvement to a certain section of your property. But the utility easement may prevent certain upgrades, such as erecting a fence or a gate.
- Vegetation restrictions: The utility company may require regular access to a particular area and constantly tear up your garden. Additionally, many utility easements limit the planting of major trees in a specified area.

An Important Message from the Environmental Protection Agency

As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals and human activity.

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

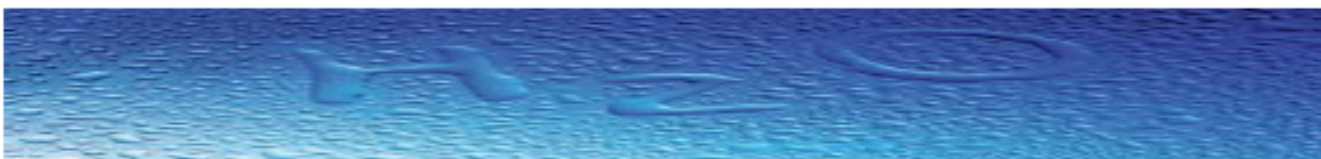

HOLLYHOCK (Althea Rosea)

Hello Christmas Valley area, we are going to write on the herb Hollyhock. From Silverton where I grew up to everywhere I've observed nature. I always do my best to take in god's scenery. From trees to flowers, the mowed grass we smell, grace is always in plain sight. Do we look or smell? Have we forgotten grace is not just a spoken word it's the ability to slow down, and do what is called meditate, listen, pray, take the beauty and the love that was created wherever you are right now, take it in, enjoy it. I like to stop and smell the roses and the coffee lol. sorry again I haven't been around a bit my mom is fighting cancer doing ok up and down but progressively slowly hopeful, getting better. fighting w p.h. corn syrup n baking soda is one of the warriors but #1 prayers thank you.

Well here in Christmas Valley at our local post office you can see a good example of Hollyhock. Tall with ruffled lily pad shaped leaves. The many colors of the trumpet shaped flowers make an awesome rainbow array.

The name Althea comes from Alcea, the ancient greek word for healing "Altho", which translates to Althea.

I read in "Gothichorrorstories.com", that the symbolism of the Hollyhock plant seeps over into the realm of the fairy folk. Fairies were said to use the blossoms as skirts. Not only that but the seed pods were known as "Fairy Cheese" beings that the seed pods looked like a cheese wheel. It was written there was a recipe dating from 1660 saying that hollyhock with 4 other herbs would allow mortals to see fairy folk.

*Commonly named Hollyhock-botanical name(Althea-Alcea Rosea)In greek mythology Althea was the goddess of healing, protection, and family.

In KJV Bible-JOB chap 30 v 3-4 Hollyhock(mallo)and juniper is mentioned as meat. The plant was also used to depict St Joseph in paintings known as "St Josephs Staff", a symbol of gods leniency.

Hollyhock is a member of a 60 herb family known as the "Malvaceae" family. Hollyhock is a biennial or a short season perennial. The trumpet shaped flowers are from 7-15 cm wide depending on variety, from 1-4 ft in height. single stem with lilly pad shaped leaves every about every 4 inches.RE:PansyMaiden.com

One of the medicinal properties of hollyhock is its demulcent quality(soothes irritation and inflammation by creating film over mucus.)Using as a tea helps with inflammation in your gastrointestinal,genitourinary(genital and urinary organs),and respiratory tracts. Adding to dry on throat teas can help ease the dry effect,helps other teas to be more soothing. can be used as a mouthwash for inflammation in mouth. Also used as an herbal wash for rash and inflamed skin,bug bites. In the middle east the mucilage from the plant is mixed with dough and olive oil then applied to tumorous area.It can add color to a salad be used as a coloring agent and a hair dye.RE:TheHerbQuarterly.com

In the history of herbal remedies hollyhock has been used for. Fever in old times the plant was used for high fever. Its antipyretic properties help clear mucus from the nasal passage and reduces fever. For sore throat and cough. Flowers,stems,roots,and seeds are used. Possible natural sugar in roots. Improves appetite-tea for appetite stimulant. Good for womens kidney and womb irritation-promotes proper evacuation and flush of system.
