10 Things You May Not Know About Martin Luther King Jr. Explore 10 surprising facts about the civil rights leader.

Baptist minister and social ac-

tivist Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (1929-1968) dedicated his life to the nonviolent struggle for justice in the United States. King's leadership played a pivotal role in ending entrenched segregation for African Americans and to the creation of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

1. King's Birth Name Was Michael, Not Martin

King was born Michael King Jr. on January 15, 1929. In 1934, however, his father, a pastor at Atlanta's Ebenezer Baptist Church, traveled to Germany and became inspired by the Protestant Reformation leader Martin Luther. As a result,

King Sr. changed his own name as well as that of his five-year-old son.

2. King Entered College At the Age of 15

King was such a gifted student that he skipped grades nine and 12 before enrolling in 1944 at Morehouse College, the alma mater of his father and maternal grandfather. Although he was the son, grandson and great-grandson of Baptist ministers, King did not intend to follow the family vocation until Morehouse president Benjamin E. Mays, a noted theologian, convinced him otherwise. King was ordained before



graduating college with a degree in sociology.

3. King Received His Doctorate in Systematic Theology

After earning a divinity degree from Pennsylvania's Crozer Theological Seminary, King attended graduate school at Boston University, where he received his Ph.D. degree in 1955. The title of his dissertation was "A Comparison of the Conceptions of God in the Thinking of Paul Tillich and Henry Nelson Wieman."

4. King's 'I Have a Dream' Speech Was Not His First At the Lincoln Memorial

Six years before his iconic ora-

tion at the March on Washing-

ton, King was among the civil rights leaders who spoke in the shadow of the Great Emancipator during the Prayer Pilgrimage for Freedom on May 17, 1957. Before a crowd estimated at between 15,000 and 30,000, King delivered his first national address on the topic of voting rights. His speech, in which he urged America to "give us the ballot," drew strong reviews and positioned him at the forefront of the civil rights leadership.

5. King Was Imprisoned Nearly 30 Times

According to the King Center, the civil rights leader went to jail 29 times. He was arrested

for acts of civil disobedience and on trumped-up charges, such as when he was jailed in Montgomery, Alabama, in 1956 for driving 30 miles per hour in a 25-mileper-hour zone.

6. King Narrowly Escaped an Assassination Attempt a Decade Before His Death

On September 20, 1958, King was in Harlem signing copies of his new book, Stride Toward Freedom, in Blumstein's department store when he was approached by Izola Ware Curry. The woman

asked if he was Martin Luther federal King Jr. After he said yes, Curry said, "I've been looking for you for five years," and she plunged a seven-inch letter opener into his chest. The tip of the blade came to rest alongside his aorta, and King underwent hours of delicate emergency surgery. Surgeons later told King that just one sneeze could have punctured the aorta and killed him. From his hospital bed where he convalesced for weeks, King issued a statement affirming his nonviolent principles and saying he felt no ill will toward his mentally ill attacker.

7. King's Last Public Speech **Foretold His Death**

King had come to Memphis in began to fire shots. 8. Members of King's Family Did Not Believe James Earl Ray Their Birthdays Observed as a **Acted Alone**

government agencies were deeply involved in the murder. She praised the result of a 1999 civil trial in which a Memphis jury decided the assassination was the result of a conspiracy and that Ray was set up to take the blame. A U.S. Department of Justice investigation released in 2000 reported no evidence of a conspiracy.

9. King's Mother Was Also Slain By a Bullet

On June 30, 1974, as 69-year-old Alberta Williams King played the organ at a Sunday service inside Ebenezer Baptist Church, Marcus Wayne Chenault Jr. rose from the front pew, drew two pistols and bullets struck and killed King, who died steps from where her The deranged gunman said that father, who was in the congregastead because she was closer. The dead. Chenault received a death penalty sentence that was later changed to life imprisonment, in part due to the King family's opposition to capital punishment.

10. George Washington and Abraham Lincoln Are the Only Other Americans to Have Had National Holiday



The Events of the Lakeview Chamber of Commerce Annual Gala included an Announcement of Lake County Fairgrounds Plans of a Future Event Center Facility


The Lakeview Chamber of Commerce did a tremendous job of hosting their annual Kentucky Derby themed Gala to present their annual community participation awards.

To lead off the awards ceremony Commissioner Mark Albertson gave the blessing and then commenced with the announcement of the Lake County Fairgrounds final planning phase of four years of planning to reshape the existing Lake County Fairgrounds. The plan is to build a \$7 Million dollar Event Center, which will consist of a free span building with an arena for rodeo and other events. It will be spacious enough to have concession areas, and designated areas for 4-H and FFA exhibits.

Commissioner Albertson said, "this facility will give kids and adults more opportunities."

Dustin Simms, a member of the fairgrounds committee, said the final planning stage is finding the funding for the project. He stated that the State has money allocated for Oregon's county fairgrounds and Lake County should see approximately \$250,000.

DOOR TO DOOR SURVEY UNDERWAY IN CHRISTMAS VALLEY

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—January 12, 2022— Residents in the Christmas Valley area may be getting a knock on their door for a very important reason. Local volunteers will be visiting door-to-door to follow up on mailed income surveys to Christmas Valley Water District residents and selected residents within 10 miles of the Christmas Valley Branch Library. A complete and accurate income survey is the first step of determining funding eligibility for improvements to the Christmas Valley Water District infrastructure and a new library facility. Income surveys must be collected from at least 80% of residents or selected residents for both projects in order to proceed.

The confidential survey is being conducted by staff at Portland State University. Every effort is being made to keep survey answers and respondents names separated. Survey answers are completely confidential. Completed surveys are returned to PSU in sealed envelopes so no local volunteers will see any survey responses. PSU will average all answers and only the averages will be shared.

"We know we are asking for information people may be uncomfortable sharing, but the benefit to the community from doing so has the potential to be huge," said Library Director Amy Hutchinson. "If the income survey is completed and the library service area qualifies, building a new branch library for Christmas Valley within the next five years suddenly becomes a very real possibility," said Hutchinson.
