"HOT" TOPIC

Some of us have really enjoyed the slow start to summer; cool nights and mild days. Other's have been anxiously awaiting typical summer weather. Which ever your preference it seems the slow start is behind us and the hot days of summer have arrived. While we may enjoy the warmer weather, the heat can present health risks if we're not careful to take precaution and pay attention.

The best precautionary thing you can do is to stay hydrated. Drinking plenty of fluids is important, but its equally important to be drinking the right fluids. Alcoholic, caffeinated and sugary drinks can be detrimental to maintaining hydration. Juice is a healthier choice and an electrolyte replacement (Gatorade or equivalent) is an even better choice, but really, the best choice is water, 6 to 8 glasses per day.

We must also be mindful of how much time we spend in the heat. It's the best time of year for yardwork and outdoor recreation and its easy to over do it. It's a good idea to do yardwork in the morning and early evening when the sun is not directly overhead. Midday is a fun time for water sports, hiking, biking and playing on motorized toys so be sure to stay hydrated and take breaks to spend time in the shade or better, in an air-conditioned space.

Oregon Department of Energy Announces \$1.25 Million in Grants for Renewable Energy Projects Across the State

SALEM — The Oregon Department of Energy announced today six recipients of \$1.25 million in Renewable Energy Development Grant funds. The RED Grant program supports Oregon businesses, nonprofits, and organizations investing in renewable energy systems that use biomass, solar, geothermal, hydroelectric, wind, landfill gas, biogas, wave, tidal, or ocean energy to produce electricity.

Earlier this year, ODOE announced \$2.75 million in available grant funds divided into two tiers for large and small renewable energy projects. ODOE received six applications for large solar projects (greater than 300 kilowatts), and the agency is able to award grant funding for all six, ranging from \$90,000 up to \$250,000. A \$250,000 grant will help fund a new utility-scale solar facility with battery storage near Christmas Valley in Lake County. A \$90,000 grant will support solar installations at housing communities serving lower-income families, older adults, and people with disabilities in La Grande. In Wallowa County, a \$250,000 grant will support a community solar installation that allows low- or moderate-income Oregonians, who may not otherwise be able to install their own solar arrays, to access renewable energy. Visit the Oregon Department of Energy's blog for a full list of selected projects.

Applications were scored based on a number of criteria, including amount of energy generated, job creation, community benefits, and more. Points were also awarded for projects that were designed with resilience in mind. Renewable systems that are capable of supplying electricity when the larger grid is unavailable – due to extreme weather or other emergencies – earned more points.

ODOE staff expect to announce the second round of grant awardees for projects smaller than 300 kilowatts later this summer. It will be the final set of awardees under the RED Grant program, which launched in 2012.

"The Oregon Department of Energy is proud to support projects that add renewable generation across Oregon," said Director Janine Benner. "And we were pleased to see applications this year that will help expand access to renewable energy for low-income

Oregonians and other underserved communities."

After a technical review, ODOE will finalize performance agreements with the awardees. Funds are allocated after the project is completed and operational, and once all conditions of the performance agreements are met.

ALKALI LAKE CHEMICAL DUMP By Dalton D. Johnson III

Nearly thirty years ago working as an Investigator for a Nation Newspaper I was assigned the task of determining if sixteen people, who all happen to live in the now ghost town of Alkali Lake, at approximately the same time. All sixteen people have been diagnosis with Multiply Myeloma (ML) who are all dead now, did indeed contract that death sentence from the chemical dump know as Alkali Lake.

American Medical Association stated that ML is directly related to what is buried in concentrated form, Agent Orange. Our living Veterans of the Vietnam War testifications has shown this to be true. Speaking to the Lake County Commissioner Brad Winters I was repeatedly told that "they had permission to store those chemicals, but the barrels started leaking". Internet...Alkali Lake chemsite. KOIN Channel 6...of the twenty six thousand fifty five gallon barrels you won't see two the same color. Notice the condition. These barrels were leaking when they arrived here. "They" had no intention of storage, but dumping. This was clearly a flagrant illegal act. The barrels don't even have a plug in the bungholes! The bottom of the pit is approximately twenty-five feet below the surface of a lake four months out of the year. The pits weren't dug level and the 1.2 million gallons pooled in the North end created an exit plume due to saturation pressure to move towards the center by the force of gravity where the hardpan is two and one half miles' thick, fissure-free. This plume of thirty-five hundred feet in length is running relatively level and up because oil floats on water. The bad news is that action is what causing the chemicals to leech into our environment from the pits. The oil is what giving these chemicals its ability to transmit by coating the Flora and Fauna and everything else and allowing time for the chemicals do their genetic damage not be washed off. Good News; the chemicals are being kept out of aquifers by the oil wanting to float to the top. The Water Moratorium in North Lake County needs to be lifted because it was based on fear and not science.

I eliminated seven of the original sixteen people I interviewed because they served in Vietnam and Agent Orange can rear its ugly head decades later. By State Law if your doctors say you have cancer they must report name, location etc. to the Oregon Disease Control (ODC). I personally delivered their medical exams to ODC and explained that their web site only says there are only two cases of ML in Lake County. Ninety-day follow-up I returned and asked why their website still only states of two cases of ML? REPLY 'Those two were probably Vietnam Vets anyway". I reread the name of their agency in a different 'light'. My on-site inspection of the dump shows very little evidence of the actual site because the lake washes everything level in a seven by fifteen-mile circumference and exactly level. One thousand yards to the west lies Hutton Springs. Hutton Springs is about the size of a city block with extremely cold and clear water flowing up out of the ground floor forming a stream with endangered fish swimming around. This artesian spring is located in the North American Flyway and filled to the brim with canisters resembling large coffee cans. The cans above the waterline are extremely deteriorated due to the elements and the pelicans using these man-made islands to fish from. The canister below the waterline look intact as the ones the EPA is presently removing from Wallow Lake. How can fish live along with the most toxic substance known to man? Again, oil floats and for the second science fact about Alkali Lake; oil and water don't mix. Hutton Springs is the headwaters of the Klamath River Drainage which drains into Northern California and Southern Oregon. These chemicals have an estimated life-span of a thousand year plus. At the least build a weir and skim the oil off the top using the same skimmers the Road Departments use after a car accident.



On July 15,2019 Attorney Foster Glass tediously answered a decades old question I've had on this dump; Why hasn't anything been done about this tragedy?

The property owners of the chemical dump known as Alkali Lake is the Department of Environmental Quality. NO matter what the Fox says; under no circumstances do you allow him to guard the henhouse.

Ruts to Roads

Ruts to Roads gives a great big shout out to the Lakeview BLM who were very helpful and encouraging throughout the permitting process. We now have a multi-year permit with a 5,000 cubic yard cap on gravel but—we go forward. Some of you were not overjoyed with the delay but we are spending your donated monies, so we were holding out for the best price. We will have to supplement the BLM permitted gravel with purchased gravel and we got a really good price with a shout out to Fritz Morrison!! Bottom line, Finally!! Ruts to Roads is taking the next step(s). While waiting for the prices on gravel, we weren't idle. We continued working on other aspects to include prioritizing roads in most need with those that gave as many people as possible 'a path'. All that considered--the first round of road 'work' [insert emergency repairs] will be Pinion, West Thorn, Maple Circle, and North Ivy. Again, we are trying to give as many people as possible—a path. Once that is done, we will see where we are on resources and consider the next steps. We are starting in Christmas Valley and working out. Let me regress a bit. We have heard people saying that we just hit up the businesses for quick money. DRUM ROLL--Total raised to date [July 20th 2019] is \$2,545.95 and our fund raising efforts include: local individuals giving \$581.25, non-local individuals giving \$425, out of area businesses giving \$1,050 (this includes the \$1,000 matching monies from Joe and Sarah Schmitt of Hang your Hat Properties), local business giving \$325, and the jar money at businesses around town collected \$164.70. SPECIAL NOTE: We are authorized 5,000 cubic yards of gravel in various rock pits with annual reports required. Only authorized persons (a very short list) can pull gravel using our permits; if you are not on the list you are not authorized!! To do so is illegal and you will be prosecuted. For those who are using other than a grader on these roads...We understand a smooth road is a wonderful thing but some of these roads have been scraped down to the hard pan (or lower) so the road is below grade, the ditches are gone, and water is trapped on the road. Please do what you can to pull the gravel back onto the road. Once we get gravel on these roads please do not use other than graders to work on roads. Lastly, please treat our roads nicely as the emergency work begins. The speed limit for our Christmas Valley roads is 35mph but slower is better. When you drive too fast spewing gravel off the road and across the bar ditch, that gravel cannot be recovered. This scenario hinders progress and is not acceptable. We have been offered use of a radar gun; it can be calibrated and used in court—please do not force our hand on this one. The We Can Foundation doing the roads was never a long-term solution. There is a community road meeting at the CV Community Hall on August 15th, at 6:30pm; come be part of the process and give us your input. One of the topics is consideration to form a road district.






