





Ethels Chuck Wagon Cook Book

Original Sourdough Bread

What you will Need

2 Cups Sourdough Starter 2 TBSP Sugar **1TSP. Salt 1TBSP.** Boiling Water

2 TBSP Melted Shortening About 8 Cups Flour 1/4 TSP. Soda

### Directions

Put starter into a large bowl and add Sugar, Salt and Shortening and stir just to combine. In another big bowl sift 4 cups of the flour, twice and make a well in center. Pour the batter into well, and with your hands work the batter, drawing in the flour little by little until a workable ball of dough is formed. Put dough in a floured board and knead in enough flour so it is smooth and elastic NOT STIFF. Grease large bowl and put dough in turning in bowl so entire dough surface is greased (this prevents a crust from forming)

Set in a warm place without drafts 8 hours or overnight.

Dissolve the soda in the boiling water, add to dough and knead well and thoroughly. Keep folding again and again for about 20 minutes. Set to rise again in a warm place till doubled in size, about 2 hours.

Form into 2 or 3 loaves and put into greased pans and let rise again for 30 minutes, bake in a HOT oven at 400 degrees for 10 minutes, then reduce to 375 and bake 40 more minutes.

## FFA Member Attends Summer Leadership Conference

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Students from across the nation attended the 2019 Washington Leadership Conference (WLC) this summer in the nation's capital. Jill Rudolf, Ella Pierson, Nik Shumway, Justin Sharp, Craig Puckett, Dalton Puckett and Joe Worden, members of the North Lake chapter attended July 19th through the July 28th.

For the past 50 years, FFA members from across the country have converged on Washington, D.C., in the summer to evaluate their personal skills and interests, develop leadership talent, and create service plans during the Washington Leadership Conference, which will make a difference in their communities.

This year is no different. Created in 1969 and held annually, more than 2,300 students attended the 2019 Washington Leadership Conference, the second-largest student experience that the National FFA Organization hosts each year.

The week long program helps FFA members improve their leadership skills and prepare for leadership roles in their chapters, communities and future careers. They attended sessions on developing authentic leadership, serving their communities and participating in civic engagement. They also participated in service learning events. "We live in an increasingly competitive world," says Dr. Larry Case, past National FFA Advisor and Coordinator, Agricultural and Rural Education with the U.S. Department of Education. "Tomorrow's leaders must develop skills in these areas to effectively compete. Every student leaves WLC with an advantage because it gives those young people cutting-edge leadership skills and valuable insight for productive citizenship."

Students also increase their understanding of the nation's heritage with visits to the National Cathedral, Arlington National Cemetery, the National Archives, Library of Congress, the Jefferson, Lincoln and Roosevelt Memorials, Holocaust Museum, World War II, Korean and Vietnam War Memorials and other historic sites in Washington, D.C.

A highlight of the week was a visit to the office of their local elected Congressman, Representative Greg Walden. The FFA members were privileged to sit down in with Rep. Walden at the Capital Building and discuss the future of agriculture and issues facing Central and rural Oregon.


After moving to Christmas Valley in 2010 she also became an avid hunter and enjoyed getting out in all new surroundings.

## LETS GO FISHING

Conditions : KLAMATH RIVER: Keno Dam to J.C Boyle Reservoir This section is closed until Oct. 1 to protect redband trout during the summer when water temperatures are excessively high.

J.C. Boyle Dam to J.C Boyle Powerhouse Flows are low and stable and fishing is good. Fishing is best below the spring inputs. The springs start to discharge into the river approximately one mile below J.C. Boyle Dam. This section of river requires a hike down steep grade to the river with the exception of the area just above the powerhouse. Water temperatures in this reach are much higher this time of the year due to this reach being dominated by springs. There is good access at the powerhouse. Park and walk upstream. This area is fished hard but you can hike to get away from the pressure. Hiking or wading upstream is difficult. Small stimulators work well in this section.

J.C. Boyle Powerhouse to State Line with California Best fishable flows will be available in the mornings and on some days the evening. Look for the various caddisfly hatches in the early afternoon. Fishing success can be good depending on how flows are managed. Best fishing is when flows are less than 900 cfs.

Large attractor flies such and wooly buggers and rubber leg stoneflies work best. Large stimulators and caddisfly dry fly patterns can work well casted to the shoreline. Reported by: Oregon D.F.W Conditions :

OCHOCO RESERVOIR: Anglers are catching trout during the cooler parts of the day. Bass and crappie fishing has been good. Reported by: Oregon D.F.W

Conditions : Klamath Lakes: Most redband trout have moved into water quality refuge areas of Pelican Bay, Wood and Williamson Rivers. Catch rates should be fair in those areas. The lake is 2.4 feet below full pool and 62 percent full. Reported by: Oregon D.F.W

Conditions : PAULINA LAKE: Anglers report good fishing for kokanee and trout. Open all year to fishing. Wild (unmarked) rainbow trout must be released. Reported by: Oregon D.F.W

Conditions : Twin Lakes: North Lake - Lake was stocked with rainbow trout the week

of July 15. Open to fishing all year. South - Lake was last stocked with rainbow trout the week of July 15. Open to fishing all

year. Reported by: Oregon D.F.W

Conditions : DIAMOND LAKE: Diamond Lake has been decent. Recent reports indicate most successful anglers are using flies with a quick retrieve or trolling. Others are having good success with floating bait off the bottom. If one technique isn't working switch to something else. Reported by: Oregon D.F.W Conditions : CLACKAMAS RIVER: Fishing is still slow on the Clackamas River. Seasons are open for hatchery steelhead and spring Chinook but fish are few and far between. Soon it may be worth targeting coho, which are just beginning to enter the mouth of the Columbia on the heels of a successful ocean coho season, which is currently underway.

The first coho in the Clackmas are usually found in the lower river, between Riverside Park and the mouth, or at the mouth of Eagle Creek as the fish make their way toward Eagle Creek National Fish Hatchery. The reality is those fish are probably still at least month away so plan any

fishing expeditions in this area accordingly.

USGS hydrological data for Aug. 7 shows river flows at 859 cfs water temperature rising at 66° F, and the gauge height virtually unchanged from a week ago at 10.67 ft. All of the readings come from the Estacada gauge near Milo McIver State Park.







These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

- Talking about wanting to die or to kill oneself.
- Looking for a way to kill oneself, such as searching online or buying a gun.
- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live.
- Talking about feeling trapped or in unbearable pain.
- Talking about being a burden to others.
- Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs.
- Acting anxious, agitated or behaving recklessly.
- Sleeping too little or too much.
- Withdrawing or feeling isolated.
- Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge.
- Displaying extreme mood swings.


