Cupping in Massage Practice Submitted by: Shawn Lavallee

Cupping is the use of suction through the drawing out of oxygen in different size glass, silicone or plastic cups. The suction lifts the soft tissue creating space and loosening of the tissue. This creates a warming response and encourages movement and flow within the body. It frees up the stagnation of blood, lymph and Qi (Chinese for life-force or energy) in the body. It helps loosen adhesions, bringing hydration and blood flow to body tissues and drain toxins by opening lymphatic pathways. It helps to boost immune system, improve range of motion in joints, decrease scar tissue post surgery or injury, increase flexibility and release chronic aching pain patterns.

Social Security scam robocalls top FTC phone scam reports, cost \$17 million so far in 2019

By Jason Knowles and Ann Pistone Friday, October 18, 2019

The number one phone scam being reported to the Federal Trade Commission are threats that your social security number is being suspended or your benefits are ending. The FTC said there are reported losses of \$17 million in just the first six months of 2019.

The robocalls sound like this: "There is a legal enforcement action filed on your social security number for criminal activity so when you get this message kindly return as soon as possible on our number that is 516...before we begin with a legal proceeding..."

MORE INFO FROM THE FTC: Government imposter scams top the list of reported frauds

The threatening calls, making you think your social security number and benefits at risk, are on the rise. One ABC7 Eyewitness news producer got a dozen in just one day.

'All your social benefits will be canceled until further clearance," another call said. "In case you feel this is due to an error you may connect with legal..."

Or you might be tricked into thinking your social security number is going away, as the calls claim "in case we did not hear from you, your social will be blocked permanently."

MORE INFO FROM THE FTC: Social Security is not trying to take your benefits

The FTC said it has 73,000 reports of complaints filed about social security impostors since January.

The scammers convince frightened victims to send money via wire transfer or gift cards. The con is that it's supposed to "re-activate" or "clear" a social security number from so-called "criminal activity."

The FTC advised to be suspicious of any call from a government agency asking for money or information, and never trust caller ID, which can be faked.

Government agencies will never ask you to wire money or pay for anything with a gift card. When in doubt hang up and check with the real agency.

HOREHOUND:

(marrubium vulgare) The leaves and aerial parts of this terribly, bitter mint - family herb works best in wet, mucous-y coughs. Horehound soothes irritation while thinning, moving and helping to expectorate mucus so your coughs are more productive yet subside. IT helps respiratory infections and allergies featuring thick mucous, such as post nasal drip._It is easy to grow at home if anyone is interested, I have local grown seed.

HONEY:

Wet or dry honey helps with all coughs. IT coats and soothes dry irritates throats while thinning excessive mucous. IT can be used with herbs as a base for herbal extraction. Do not give honey to children under one year old due to risk of clostridium botulinum spores that may proliferate in the low - acid immature gut flora of infants intestines.

MENTHOL AND PEPPERMINT:

(Mentha piperita) have anti - spasmodic and mucolytic properties, helping reduce the cough threshold.

I have put together a tea for winter before that has worked wonders on some. It consists of Yarrow, Horehound, Mullen, Horse Radish Root, Comfrey, Hyssop, Rose Hips and Mint. I also have herbal cough syrup with all these and honey. The results are great.

North Lake FFA Places First at District Soils Competition By: Judah Koehler, North Lake Reporter

On October 9th North Lake FFA competed in the Central Oregon District Soils contest in Culver. There was a total of 20 North Lake students competing in Beginning and Advanced Contests.

The Advanced team placed 1st, Culver took 2nd and Bend took 3rd. Justin Sharp had the top overall score of the contest and Ella Pierson had the second spot. Clayton Cooper had the 5th high individual score in the competition.

In the Beginning competition Tom Rudolf had the 3rd high individual score, Hannah Maielua was 4th and Tyler McAulay was fifth. As a team, North Lake place second getting edge out by Culver. Bend placed 3rd. Both teams will be competing at the State competition in Irrigon Oregon late in October.

The main objective of the Soils Career Development Event is to encourage students to explore soils and plant science career opportunities. Students learn how to describe key properties of soils horizons and to interpret them in terms of management practices—and to develop a sense of stewardship for the land. By learning and understanding important properties of the soil, students will be able to manage the soil wisely and make a number of important decisions about drainage, irrigation, crop selection and erosion control.

Students are required to calculate the slope and determine the soil texture, color and structure, identify mottles, course fragments, horizons and any "special features" like duripans, fragipans and tillage pans. The students then have to use that information to calculate the available water holding capacity, effective rooting depth, surface and subsoil permeability, water and wind erosion hazard, parent material, site position, internal drainage, drainage feasibility, most intensive crop for the site, erosion control practices, pH corrections and septic tank limitations.

Complete Application for Site Certificate and Public Informational Meeting

Summary:

Date Notice Issued: October 30, 2019

<u>Proposal</u>: Photovoltaic (PV) solar power generation facility providing a nominal generating capacity of approximately 400 megawatts. The facility may also include potential battery energy storage.

<u>Location</u>: North Lake County, approximately eight miles northwest of Christmas Valley and seven miles southeast of Fort Rock.

Introduction:

The Oregon Department of Energy (ODOE), staff to the Energy Facility Siting Council (EFSC), received an Application for Site Certificate from Obsidian Solar Center LLC, a subsidiary of Obsidian Renewables LLC, to construct and operate the Obsidian Solar Center. The proposed solar facility would be a photovoltaic (PV) solar power generation facility on approximately 3,921 acres, providing a nominal generating capacity of approximately 400 megawatts plus potential addition of battery energy storage. Under Oregon law, the applicant must obtain a site certificate from EFSC before constructing and operating the proposed facility. The applicant submitted a complete application on October 17, 2019.

57566 Fort Rock Road Silver Lake, OR 97638 ODOE will hold a public informational meeting with the applicant to provide information about the proposed facility and the Energy Facility Siting Council review process. The informational meeting will include a presentation starting at 6 p.m. ODOE and applicant representatives will be available before and after the presentation to answer specific questions.

The public informational meeting is not a public hearing and will not include public testimony or onthe-record public comments. Opportunity for written or oral testimony will be provided at a later date – during the draft proposed order (DPO) public comment period and public hearing – following issuance of the DPO, as described below.

Description of Proposed Facility:

The proposed solar photovoltaic energy facility would occupy up to 3,921 acres and provide a nominal generating capacity of approximately 400 megawatts. The facility may also include battery energy storage capabilities.

The applicant is also seeking EFSC review and approval of related or supporting facilities associated with the energy facility, including: 34.5-kilovolt (kV) collection system, up to four collector substations approximately one acre each, approximately two miles of 115-kV gen-tie transmission line, one 115/500-kV step-up substation and transformer, up to two operations and maintenance buildings, access and service roads and gates, temporary staging areas, and an approximately 18-mile perimeter fence. Related or supporting facilities associated with the proposed battery storage facilities would include steel-frame enclosures for batteries, cell stacks (where battery charge and discharge occurs), and Balance of Plant, which includes large polymer tanks, contained within the storage containers.

EFSC Review Process:

The site certificate process is a consolidated, comprehensive siting process. The applicant must demonstrate that the proposed facility meets EFSC Standards established under Oregon Revised Statute

(ORS) 469.501 and set forth in Oregon Administrative Rule (OAR) Chapters 345, Division 22 and 24, as well as all other applicable Oregon statutes, rules and standards. ODOE serves as staff to EFSC and conducts the application review process.

The proposed Obsidian Solar Center is an energy facility subject to EFSC jurisdiction under the definition in ORS 469.300(11)(a)(D)(iii). As such, the proposed facility must receive a site certificate from EFSC before construction can begin.

Upcoming Review Phases:

ODOE is currently preparing the draft proposed order (DPO), which will include staff's analysis of the application, based on ODOE's review of the application as well as comments received from state agencies, Tribal governments, and the Lake County government. If the DPO recommends approval of the facility, the DPO would include recommended conditions of approval for EFSC's consideration.

Following issuance of the DPO, ODOE will open a public comment period and EFSC will conduct a public hearing in the vicinity of the proposed facility. At that time, to preserve your right to participate in the contested case proceeding and any subsequently appeal of EFSC's decision, you must comment during the public comment period on the DPO, either orally at the public hearing or in writing during the comment period. ODOE anticipates issuing the DPO in late 2019. The Department will issue notice of the public hearing and comment period when it issues the DPO. As described above, the November 2019 public informational meeting is not a public hearing.




