Take off heat and mix in the BBQ sauce</li> <li>Let the Instant Pot depressurize before removing the meat for pulling. Place meat on a plate to discard all bones. Pull apart. Combine the rabbit into the sauce and serve.</li> <li>*Serve on a deli bun with coleslaw or top on a bed of wild rice.</li> </ul>

List: Fresh clean unwashed eggs (Do Not use store purchased eggs) Hydrated Lime 1 to 5 gal Food Grade container w/lid Water (filtered or distilled) Kitchen scale The solution calculation: 8 oz (ounces by weight) of hydrated lime per qt of water. *One quart of water glass will treat about 16 dozen eggs. Watch a "How to" video: https://youtu.be/bTlcCvvUjI0	Direction: Begin by filling your container with desired amount of water, mix in the hydrated lime. This will turn the water a milky color as the lime is dissolved. Once mixed, place in your unwashed clean fresh eggs. Gently layer small side down to ensue egg quality when possible. Leaving a minimum of two inches of solution above the eggs. Cover with lid and store in a dark pantry. As you gather eggs, continue to layer adding more solution as needed until the container is full. Ues: Take eggs out of the solution as needed, rinse thoroughly and use. A Message from Lake County Sheriff's Department (Office) and Prevention Department

The school year is starting...

And with it all the traditions of the classic high school experience, but there's one tradition we're encouraging parents and students not to embrace; underage drinking.

The Lake County Sheriff's Department (Office) now officially covers the town of Lakeview and it is actively paying attention to this issue. There are legal consequences for underage drinking, drinking and driving, and providing alcohol to a minor. Don't risk your future.

We are a community that cares; about young people, their lives, their future's, their choices. Underage drinking has no place in that.

On a recent survey of Lake County students, 11th graders believed that more than <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of their peers were drinking. They're not. The actual number is less than half. We can do better. So, if your student tries to claim that "everyone's doing it," talk to them about making choices that support their future, not risk it.

Teaching our kids that there are consequences for illegal behavior prepares them to be responsible adults. Teaching them that they can ignore the law, and introducing them to alcohol before their brain is fully developed is a recipe for a potentially troubled future.

What is the common thread between auto accidents, suicide, sexual assault, unintended teen pregnancy, low school engagement, attendance, and drop-out rates all have in common? Alcohol.





# BACK IN THYME

### CBD:Plant Medicine Part 3

### HEMP "VS" CANNABIS

EXTRACTED CBD: You have two choices: CBD derived from hemp or CBD derived from the THC. CBD can be extracted from both, but there is a reason why it matters. If you were to see cannabis and hemp next to each other, you couldn't tell the difference. They look the same as they come from the same species: Cannabis sativa. The difference is in order for a plant to be classified as "HEMP", it has to be bred to contain very low THC levels, the principal psychoactive constituent of cannabis (what causes the high") less then .3 percent. When CBD is derived from Hemp, there are only minute traces of THC. When derived from cannabis there are larger amounts of THC present. If you are sensitive to THC or don't want to experience the possible psychoactive effects, you are better off with hemp derived CBD. Although there are benefits from cannabis CBD.

### HEMP - DERIVED CBD

In 2018 the Farm Bill legalized the cultivation of hemp, removing hemp and hemp derived products from its former Schedule I status within the Controlled Substances Act. Making CBD derived from hemp federally legal in the US so that its accessible to anyone that wants to try it.

Health Food stores and a few grocery stores now carry CBD products such as oils, capsules, tinctures, salves and edibles like chocolates, cookies and gummies. The dosage of these products varies, and where to start depends on you tolerance and ailment. Taking 10-25mg of CBD is a great place to start fir new users. If you especially sensitive to medications, you may want to start with 5mg you might not feel the effect of the medicine, but it will provide a gauge for how your body will respond.

Once you've tried it, you may wish to increase it. You can go online and search "Hemp-Derived CBD products" and find lots of choices, but while the FDA has regulatory authority over CBD, it has not established any definitive set of rules for the industry other than barring cannibal products from being sold as dietary supplements. As a result, there are serious quality control issues in the market at the moment. Products can be poorly labeled, have inconsistent quality and/or be overly processed, or they might contain toxins like pesticides, mold, and solvent residues. You will need to research reputable brans to find good quality CBD. Consumer Reports suggests looking for products made in states that have legalized recreational ad medical use of cannabis as they have more regulations and testing procedures in place.

### ALKALI LAKE CHEMICAL DUMP/ CLEANUP By D D Johnson III

The owners of this chemical dump is the Department of Environmental Quality and they don't cleanup waste sites they only monitor in which they have been doing for over fifty years here in Lake County. In their studies and admission by the site manager Robert Shultz the world's most toxic substances are leeching into our environment and killing the people who happen to be caught downwind. It's not their job to clean up this job, only monitor. Oregon Disease Control is to record the number of cases of cancer and other types of diseases that occur in Oregon. If they were truthful the chaos and mayhem that would ensure confusion on the true cause of the origin of the diseases here in Oregon. Don't expect these people to do the right thing it's going to be the 'We the people' who are going to clean it up.

'We' got millions of gallons of toxic chemicals that are mixed with oil and buried twenty feet in the ground underneath a lake and its natural reaction is to raise to the top and blow away in the wind. This dump is located on the edge of a 'hardpan' that measures seven miles by fifteen miles in circumference. The chemicals need to be dug up and mixed with a substance to absorb the oil and reinterned closer to the center where the 'pan' is two miles thick and fissure free. This inert substance is Borax. The very first load of Twenty Mule Borax came from Oregon and less that hundred miles from Alkali Lake. I feel the down winders; Harney County would be pleased with the economy boost this cleanup would provide by mining their resources. But does it absorb oil?

Ever get out of a shower and have that towel slide across your back and not soak up the water? Standing in the sun your cotton t-shirt or denim jeans stick to your skin? That is because your laundry soap, shampoo, hand soap and dishwasher soap have oil in its contents. Wash your cloths in your regular soap then wash again in hot water with only Borax. That towel that didn't work before because it was full of oil, the cotton cloths the were sticking to you because the sun was heating up the oil and you will absorb your sweat plus keep you cooler. Shower at the end with bottle one third water, borax and a space so you shake up the mix pour it over your head and you will feel cleaner because your skin can breathe because you're not covered in oil. Your dishes will reveal every scratch because it not filled with oil. The gal on TV who shows you the 'sparkling' dish coming out the dishwasher is showing you the reflection off the oil. This the decontamination process of Alkali Lake, warm water to loosen the oil and Borax to absorb. Borax has been shown to detoxify. Drink a quart of water with one half tablespoon of Borax, again leave room to shake up mix. You be the judge the very next time you use the bathroom if it detoxifies.

A new pit must be built to house the entire mess with an overhead crane displacing the contaminated material in an even manner. The new excavated material mixed with borax would be transferred under warm water and borax to control dust and detoxify. Using the material from the new pit mixed with water and borax would become the bottom layer and sidewall with gravity being the bonding agent. A magnet would remove the 26,000 fifty-five gallon barrels and placed in separate pit in highly liquid solution of borax to penetrate crushed metal. The cap would be the same material that lines the pit, excavated material water, and Borax. If the oil rises it would have go thru this intense mix. Mats that indicate the presence of oil would be placed on the surface. The chemicals that have left the pit in the past fifty years and contaminated the landscape would be handled during the winter when the snow is present. Aerial spraying of Borax on the snow and when the snow melted, bringing the oil to the surface only to be met with detoxification.

Would this process work? It would work better than the Department of Environmental Quality do nothing policy. Hutton Springs needs to be caged off until a better solution is developed. Whoever allowed this forty-foot-deep oasis to be filled with canisters of unknown substances in the headwaters of the Klamath River Drainage needs to be placed in front of a wall and shot.
